20 Years of Protecting Youth

“When the diocesan Office for the Protection of Children and Young People (OPCYP) was established 20 years ago in the wake of the church’s clergy sexual abuse crisis, the goal was to educate the laity and the clergy that child abuse occurs, teach how to detect the warning signs and most importantly, instruct how to protect children in the church’s care...

Twenty years later, OPCYP’s two core activities to protect youths — background checks and safe environment training — remain key. All clergy, employees and volunteers with substantial contact must successfully clear the background checks and participate in the adult safe environment training within 45 days of application submission. The old paper application system, which took an hour and a half to complete, has been replaced by an online application that takes 13 minutes...”

Credible Allegations

During the timeframe of this report, the Diocese received no new allegations of sexual abuse of a minor by a diocesan priest.

All allegations are reported to the local authorities immediately and those involving the clergy are submitted for review to the Diocesan Review Board.

Office of Victim Assistance

Who We Are and What We Do...

The Office of Victim Assistance exists to reach out to persons harmed through sexual abuse by clergy, lay employees, and volunteers in the Catholic Church. In June 2002, the Catholic bishops of the United States met in Dallas and approved the Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which established this office. The Charter was a continuation of efforts already underway to respond to the increasingly clear problem of child abuse in the Church and society. More recently, the bishops have renewed their pledge to protect children in the future and minister to those who have been harmed in the past. Finding remedies for past harm can be a complicated process, yet our hope is that we can have a positive impact on those who approach our diocese for assistance. Our Bishop, priests, the diocesan staff, and the lay faithful experience deep sorrow for the pain that is suffered, and our prayers for hope and healing go out to all victims/survivors of sexual abuse.

In the past year, the Victim Assistance staff has endeavored to reach out to persons throughout the diocese and assist in their healing and recovery through a variety of programs. Because specific needs vary based upon individual preferences and circumstances, the office offered Masses and prayer services throughout the diocese specifically to pray for healing, an annual retreat, and in-person sharing groups (support groups). We continue to offer virtual group meetings to share, support, and receive prayer and guidance. As before, counseling and therapy by licensed professionals, and spiritual guidance by specially trained priests, religious sisters, and lay people were provided to assist the healing process. The Office of Victim Assistance hopes to accompany each person on the journey towards healing and wholeness.

Reporting Service

This third-party reporting service has been created to gather and relay reports of sexual misconduct involving bishops of the United States, and reports of their intentional interference in a sexual abuse investigation. For more information and to make a report online, please visit ReportBishopAbuse.org or call 1-800-276-1562. The Catholic Bishop Abuse Reporting Service will receive and relay those reports to the proper Church authorities for investigation. Where a report includes a crime, such as the sexual abuse of a minor, it will also be reported to civil authorities. Otherwise, reports will be kept confidential.

Office for the Protection of Children and Young People

In 1991, the Diocese of Arlington began the implementation of a structured and proactive program for the prevention of child sexual abuse. Today, Bishop Michael Burbidge continues to direct the diocesan programs and policies that safeguard our children in every youth activity throughout the diocese. *The Policy for the Protection of Children and Young People and the Prevention of Sexual Misconduct* is our diocese's comprehensive and systematic program designed to protect children. This policy guides our programs and is in full accord with the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People. Over the last year, the Office of Child Protection and Safety (OCPS) continued its commitment to assist every diocesan location in providing a safe environment for youth and adults through education and training. In addition, background checks were conducted for all employees and volunteers that have substantial contact with children.

Bishop Burbidge, after consulting and working with the Review Board, developed and promulgated an updated set of Bylaws to guide and govern the Review Board in its deliberations and decisions.

The *Office for the Protection of Children and Young People* provided during the FY23:

- Four *Teens & Technology* training presentations to three Diocesan parishes and three for Christian schools
- Four *Bought with a Price* trainings that address the problem of pornography from a biological and psychological viewpoint in one Diocesan high schools
- Updated and launched a new set of liaison trainings for the 119 parish and school liaisons.
- Joined the Professional Background Screeners Association to further the Diocesan understanding of how we may better implement our screening processes.
