Fiscal stewardship of your generous contributions will always be a primary responsibility for the Catholic Diocese of Arlington. With your prayers, continued commitment and selfless witness to the faith, we were able to maintain and, in fact, enhance our ministries and services in a year filled with unparalleled challenges. Now that we have successfully emerged from the lowest points of the pandemic with open churches, schools and ministries, I can say with great confidence that your gifts have made our diocesan ministries sustainable and capable of withstanding tremendous adversity and setbacks.

For the 2021 and 2022 fiscal years, we launched three ambitious initiatives, all of which will invite participation of the diocesan faithful: the "Synod on Synodality: Communion, Participation, and Mission," a two-year process of listening and dialogue; the beginning of our Golden Jubilee, a commemoration that will have two preparatory years, crowned by the celebratory Golden Jubilee in 2024; and the announcement of a five-year Strategic Plan, 2022–2026, which will address our diocese's many spiritual and pastoral needs.

Our diocese continues to have extraordinary promise and potential. As your bishop, I look forward to another year in which we will be in awe of God's grace, be challenged to do more, and journey together in faith.

Be assured of my prayers for you. Through the intercession of Mary our Mother and Saint Joseph, may Our Lord Jesus bless you and fill you with his peace.



The Diocese of Arlington has begun preparing for the Synod on Synodality, a two-year Churchwide effort culminating in an Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops in October 2023 at the Vatican. The upcoming synod is meant to examine the way the Church views synodality and will focus on the keywords communion, participation and mission.

"A synod of bishops is a process, a gathering by which bishops throughout the world ... offer counsel and perspective to the Holy Father regarding pastoral matters in our own diocese and within our church," explained Bishop Michael F. Burbidge in announcing the initiative.




ANNUAL OPERATIONAL FUNDING: BISHOP'S LENTEN APPEAL (BLA)

The BLA was created in 1977 to communicate the annual diocesan funding priorities to parishioners and to invite them to partner with the Bishop to support and strengthen vital ministries and programs in our diocese. As disciples of Christ, we show our gratitude for God's many blessings by sharing our gifts to bring the hope of Christ into the lives of thousands of people in need of spiritual, charitable and educational assistance across our diocese. Traditionally, 45–50% of diocesan operating income is realized from this annual appeal. For CY 2021, \$19.2 million has been pledged to date from approximately 32,000 households.



COMBINED STATEMENT OF PARISH FINANCIAL ACTIVITIES


Total parish revenue from all sources, including parish schools, was approximately \$280 million. Over 84% of our parishes and missions ended the year with an operating surplus. On an overall basis (i.e., operating and capital results combined), our parishes reported a net surplus of \$25.5 million. \$16.5 million of SBA PPP loans received in FY20 were forgiven this fiscal year and recognized as grant income. Additionally, parishes received an extraordinary dividend from their cooperative savings bank DIAL Corp. DIAL Corp accumulated excess equity due to excellent financial performance over the last several years, and \$17.4 million was distributed back to the parishes and schools, considering the needs they were facing during this global pandemic.

CHURCHES

Diocesan churches reported an operating surplus of \$16.2 million, a \$2.4 million increase from the previous year. Total operating revenue was in excess of \$122 million and total expenditures were \$107 million. Offertory support decreased by \$1.9 million.










CATHOLIC SCHOOLS FINANCIAL SUMMARY

Parish schools' operating revenue totaled \$102.7 million; direct tuition, parish investment in school, and tuition assistance make up more than 87% of the revenues in our elementary schools. Total tuition assistance for 2021 was \$5.9 million. The Diocesan Tuition Assistance Program funded \$2.4 million, Tax Credit Scholarship funded \$2 million, and the additional \$1.5 million was funded through the parish, school or other sources.









- Our Catholic schools are joyful communities committed to providing an education rooted in the Gospel of Jesus Christ where Catholic doctrine, values and academic excellence prepare each student for a life of faith, service and integrity.
- The Office supports 37 elementary schools, 4 high schools, 3 early childhood centers and 5 independent schools comprising an FY22 enrollment of 18,080 students.
- The Diocese of Arlington experienced an increase of 7.8% in enrollment.
- Hispanic enrollment increased by 5%; overall Hispanic enrollment is now at 16%.
- All diocesan schools have enrolled students with disabilities.
- 15 diocesan schools have enrolled students with intellectual disabilities, an increase of 5 schools over the previous year.
- Nearly \$6 million in tuition assistance was provided to students in 2020-2021.
- Our 2021 high school graduates received more than \$70 million in college scholarships.



SERVE, PROTECT AND WELCOME: A LOOK BACK ON A YEAR AT CATHOLIC CHARITIES







Northern Virginia's struggle with the coronavirus continued throughout the 2020-2021 fiscal year, and Catholic Charities found creative ways to rise to the challenge of serving those most affected by the health and economic impacts of the pandemic.

But the coronavirus was not the only obstacle faced by the children, women, men and families Catholic Charities serves. By year's end, Catholic Charities welcomed a steadily increasing number of refugees who fled violence and persecution in Afghanistan.

SERVING THE POOR

Many families in our diocese continue to experience the effects of the COVID pandemic. COVID outbreaks continue to force temporary closures, from preschools to construction sites, which means employees don't get paychecks. Catholic Charities has long provided emergency assistance to individuals and families for whom finances are a constant struggle, as well as working people who find themselves in need of assistance for the first time.

One of the 3,620 clients who needed emergency financial assistance last year was Shannon, a preschool teacher, who with her police officer husband is raising four teenagers. She recalls the stress of balancing rent, utilities, food, and medical bills after COVID forced her school to shut down twice, an exposure from extended family members forced her into guarantine another time, and her daughter needed emergency surgery.

The family was almost \$4,000 in arrears on its rent and utility bills were piling up. They made a "good" income and usually were able to get by, but with a growing family money was often tight. Now they worried about being thrown out of their home.

Catholic Charities stepped in and paid their back rent and utility bills. Overall, Catholic Charities provided \$6.3 million in rent, utility, medical care, food and other support last fiscal year.

PROTECTING THE VULNERABLE AND STRENGTHENING FAMILIES

Our faith shows us that all life is sacred. One way we live out that belief is through Catholic Charities' service to the vulnerable, especially the most vulnerable of all: unborn children, families in crisis, and abused and neglected children.

For 74 years, Catholic Charities has provided pregnancy and adoption support and placed children in permanent, loving homes. We provide counseling, case management, financial and other services to stabilize families, as well as pregnancy options counseling, parenting assistance, adoption planning, home studies, training, and ongoing support to all clients. Catholic Charities remains a lifelong resource to all birth parents, adoptive families and adoptees.

Last year, Catholic Charities provided pregnancy and adoption services and support to more than 400 birth mothers and fathers, foster children, infants, pregnant woman, families in crisis, and adoptive families.


WELCOMING THE STRANGER

As a Catholic entity, Catholic Charities welcomes the stranger or migrant, as Jesus himself was a stranger when his family fled to Egypt for safety.


For almost 50 years, Catholic Charities has welcomed refugees and immigrants from all over the world, including Central and South America, the Middle East, Africa, Asia, and Europe.

Over the last year, Catholic Charities welcomed more than 400 desperate Afghan refugees with Special Immigrant Visas. Many of these families arrived with nothing more than a suitcase. Our staff helped them secure housing, find good jobs, enroll their children in school, and navigate the medical system. We also provided cultural integration into American society.



Dear Fellow Members of our Diocesan Church,

As we close out a second year plagued with the uncertainties and unpredictable nature of the COVID pandemic, I believe we are all suffering weariness and pray to move toward normalcy in our day-to-day lives. While we have continued to navigate these turbulent waters for a second fiscal year in a row, we endeavored to manage and steward the resources of the Church with great care and hope to bring ministries, services and operations back to a more predictable and



ordinary environment. At the time of writing this letter, I am optimistic as our churches and schools are fully open, our ministries and outreach have renewed energy, and, through the leadership of Bishop Michael F. Burbidge, an exciting strategic plan has been developed to guide our efforts over the next five years (see page 3)!

On behalf of Bishop Burbidge, as well as the Diocesan Finance Council, I present to you the Annual Financial Report for the Diocese of Arlington for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2021. This report demonstrates the care and prudence with which we manage the resources that you, the faithful, so generously provide. While last year's operations produced a deficit as a result of the COVID shutdown, the current year operations returned a modest operating surplus. In addition to the return to operations characterized as closer to ordinary, we also experienced a few extraordinary results as well. First, diocesan investment returns, related to endowments and operating reserves, experienced healthy

gains commensurate with the overall market conditions. Second, we were blessed to have received loan forgiveness related to the Paycheck Protection Program from the Small Business Administration that was provided two years ago for the payroll costs incurred to keep all diocesan employees fully compensated throughout the pandemic. Third, actuarial adjustments in clergy pension and health obligations provided for further gains in our financial condition.

Reflecting on the weariness experienced through the last two years, I have found myself turning to Jesus' words as recorded in Matthew 11:28; "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." Pray God, we have renewed confidence that our current direction and momentum engender in us hope and enthusiasm, especially as we are guided to bring the Diocese of Arlington Strategic Plan 2022-2026 into fulfillment.

- EMPLOYEE BENEFITS AND HUMAN RESOURCES, which serves the nearly 4,600 employees of our parishes, schools and diocesan offices
- OFFICE OF PLANNING, CONSTRUCTION AND FACILITIES, which provides technical and fiduciary oversight in addition to project management for the physical development and maintenance of parish and diocesan properties
- OFFICE OF THE GENERAL COUNSEL, which provides legal services to parishes and the Diocese
- OFFICE OF INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY, which provides information technology support for diocesan ministries and offices
- OFFICES OF FINANCE AND ACCOUNTING, which serve as a resource to parishes with regard to financial matters, as well as overseeing parish internal audits and diocesan financial administration. Services are also provided to DIAL Corp, the Foundation for the Catholic Diocese of Arlington, Catholic Charities and the Arlington Catholic Herald
- OFFICE OF RISK MANAGEMENT, which provides oversight with regard to the diocesan property and casualty self-insurance program, and assists the parishes and schools with related riskmitigating initiatives
- OFFICE OF DEVELOPMENT, which assists in parish and diocesan stewardship programs



OPERATING INCOME



BISHOP'S LENTEN APPEAL (BLA) accounted for more than \$18 million in income in 2021 to support ministries and programs throughout the Diocese. BLA contributions fund pastoral programs, religious personnel development, education, and social services contribute to the administrative support of ministries and offices at the diocesan level.

DONATIONS, BEQUESTS AND MISCELLANEOUS CONTRIBUTIONS totaled more than \$10 million. Current-year donations and bequests continue to be a source of funds for both donor-supported programs and long-term strategic funding needs, securing the future growth and well-being of our diocesan church. Because of the unpredictable and restricted nature of this type of income, we do not budget this activity in "operations." Donations of \$2.8 million in 2021 include a restricted contribution from St. Paul VI Catholic High School for the purpose of reducing the bond obligation related to the new school facility.

PARISH ASSESSMENT accounted for more than \$7 million in operating income in 2021. This income is calculated and paid by parishes as a function of the regular parish offertory. Eight percent of the parish offertory, as of June 30, is computed and paid in monthly installments in the subsequent year. This income supports offices that serve parish, school and diocesan administration.

PROGRAM REVENUE includes registration and professional development fees for a variety of initiatives, including WorkCamp, Conferences for the Engaged and catechetical certification. Amounts contributed to and received by the Tribunal also are included in program revenue.

INVESTMENT INCOME FOR PROGRAMS totaling \$3.3 million reflects the budgetary amount anticipated from the investment returns of diocesan reserves and/or endowments. Actual investment returns may or may not be indicative of what is budgeted and utilized for operational need.

PASTORAL OFFICES include those involved with evangelization and communicating the Faith: Office of Youth, Campus, and Young Adult Ministries; Hospital Ministry; the Office for Marriage, Family and Respect Life; the Spanish Apostolate; the Office of Multicultural Ministries; the Permanent Diaconate Program, Tribunal and Parish Subsidies; the Virginia Catholic Conference; the Diocese's support of two missions in the Dominican Republic; St. Rose of Lima Priests' Retirement Villa and the San Damiano Spiritual Life Center.

EDUCATION includes the Office of Catholic Schools, the Office of Faith Formation and the Tuition Assistance Program.

RELIGIOUS PERSONNEL DEVELOPMENT includes the Office of Vocations (seminarian education) and other religious personnel development programs.

SOCIAL SERVICES include the diocesan subsidy to Catholic Charities, the Office of Child Protection and Victim Assistance and other charitable causes.

DIOCESAN BISHOP AND COMMUNICATIONS The Bishop is responsible for teaching, governing, and sanctifying the faithful of the Diocese. He provides ministry through personal interactions, by traveling across the Diocese for sacramental and pastoral purposes, and digital and media production presence.

NOTE: The extraordinary operating loss of \$4.6M experienced in fiscal year 2020 was chiefly due to three factors: first, a reduction of assessment income of \$1.3M reflective of relief offered to parishes for the last two months of the fiscal year; second, \$2M in expenses associated with the completion of the new PVI campus, including startup costs; and finally, \$1.3M in payroll costs associated with our commitment to keep all employees fully paid through the pandemic shut-down.

GROWTH AND RENOVATION





The Office of Planning, Construction and Facilities is actively working on **more than 80 construction and renovation projects** with a total capital investment budget of more than \$61 million.

- PLANNED NEW CONSTRUCTION: St. Paul Mission Church, Hague (2021); St. Ambrose, Annandale (2023); St. Katharine Drexel Mission, Haymarket (2023); Good Shepherd Chapel, Alexandria (2022).
- HIGH SCHOOL PROJECTS: Bishop O'Connell (major renovation, addition and new Chapel completed 2021); and Bishop Ireton (planned Chapel improvements 2023).











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
